SCOTDANCE USA UPDATES

The 2021 ScotDance USA Annual General Meeting was held in July at the Sawgrass Marriott Resort in Ponte Verda Beach, Florida. The AGM was well attended both in person and via Zoom.

The hotel was scheduled to host the 2021 USIR National Championships. Since all championships for 2021 had been cancelled due to Covid-19, the USIR 2021 committee from the Southeast Region created a wonderful dance event called the Citrus Classic Competition Series (CCCS). The weekend included competitions for all dance levels, including individual choreographies and special dance events like the Pat Johnston Memorial Hornpipe and Jig Challenge.

The AGM meeting was chaired by SDUSA President, Fred DeMarse. He shared the news that the Board of Directors had been meeting via Zoom almost weekly since the pandemic started. The BOD and the Professional Development Committee have been working to find ways to keep SDUSA professionals and dancers engaged via virtual events over the past year. The virtual events included choreography classes and routines, parent lectures and training, dance technique and strength training classes and more. The BOD was pleased that SDUSA had received approval from the Royal Scottish Official Board of Highland Dancing to "reopen" dance competitions in the US. It was reported that the US has had several competitions since the June 1, 2021 "reopen" date. The competition organizers and their volunteers were recognized for doing a great job in following the Covid-19 protocols as set forth by ScotDance USA. Although competitions have restarted, it was reported that the overall dancer registration numbers are down compared to last year. It was mentioned that more dancers may register later this year when a competition close to them is scheduled. All SDUSA members are challenged to keep our dancers involved and to attract new dancers.

Other ongoing BOD projects included a revision of the Policies and Procedures and the Risk Management Policies. A comment was made that the BOD had made a 10-year plan several years ago and that we had met or exceeded many of the goals that had been listed.

The Alumni Connections Committee made a short presentation reviewing what we had achieved since we "regrouped" in August 2020. It was announced that Alumni pins were available at the CCCS main desk and all were invited to the August 28, 2021 Zoom Happy Hour.

Harry Farrar of Woodland Hills, CA, began Highland Dance at a very young age. His mother Sharon Farrar was his teacher.

Harry had a very successful dancing career and was the Adult USIR Champion three times.

Harry took up the bagpipes along the way and continues to play today. He was a founding member of the performance band, Scottish Pipes and Drums. His wife Amanda and his son Harry VI also play in Scottish Pipes and Drums. Harry and Amanda's daughter Mary Cassidy is a dancer, and she has competed in the USIR as well.

Beyond the Ghillies: Tina Gilbertson Readshaw

Tina comes from a family of dancers on her mother's side, who then went on to play bagpipes or drums. So of course, she wanted to follow in their footsteps! Tina grew up in Northern California and Norine Harmon was her Highland Dancing teacher. She started dancing at a very early age. Competing in the 12 and Under class, she was the 2nd Runner Up in the 1983 USIR, and 1st Runner Up in 1984 and 1985. She later became a Highland teacher.

At age 12 Tina started playing the bagpipes. She started out with the Prince Charles Junior Pipe Band of San Francisco. Tina then played with the Vancouver Ladies and Triumph Street for a couple of years each. After that she played with the Los Angeles Scots Pipe Band and then again with the Prince Charles Pipe Band of San Francisco. Tina also competed in solos, and reached the level of Grade I.

In addition, Tina was also a highly sought-after dancing piper because she had been a dancer herself! Tina was one of a select few who competed in the USIR and then later piped for the dancers at a USIR.

Tina really enjoyed the Highland Games on the West Coast, was very happy dancing and piping, and loved the entire Scottish Community.

Tina now lives in Australia with her husband and children.

By dancing, piping in solos and bands, and piping for dancers, she was able to stay involved and contribute for many years!

A knee injury ended Ian's Highland career much sooner than he would have liked. Since he enjoyed competing so much, and he wanted to stay involved in the Scottish Community, Ian decided to take up the bagpipes. He became a solo competitor and a piper with the Cameron Highlanders Pipe Band in San Diego, of which he is Pipe Major of their Grade 5 band.

But Ian's participation in Scottish arts and activities doesn't end there! He also served as Chieftain of the San Diego Scottish Highland Games from 1986 To 1993. And he was also very involved in Bydand Forever, The Gordon Highlanders of 1882. This is a military regiment reenactment group that is based in Southern California.
