SCRUTINEERING HIGHLAND DANCE

Scrutineering is an important job at any dance competition and FUSTA feels strongly that training should be available for those who want to learn how to scrutineer. As part of its Scrutineer Certification program, an instruction manual with practice pages and a final exam were developed by FUSTA. Those who pass the test are included in FUSTA's data bank of certified scrutineers. Any organizer in need of certified scrutineers may contact FUSTA for names of volunteers.

Those who scrutineer hold a position of trust where confidentiality is essential. Although cell phones are not banned from scrutineering areas at this time, any scrutineer found using a phone or other electronic device to pass confidential information including the results before they are announced or judges' comments will no longer be permitted to scrutineer any Competitions, Championships, or Premierships registered with FUSTA.

<u>Scrutineering a Highland Dance Championship, Premiership or Competition by</u> <u>Hand</u>

In a Championship such as a Regional or National final or in a Premiership, it is highly recommended to have at least four scrutineers who can check one another's results. In some cases you might have two sets of people using separate computers. In other cases two people enter the data into a computer while the others tabulate the results by hand. It is always a good idea, but not a requirement, to have a team tabulate by hand when using a computer program. When there are six or more age groups in a Championship or Premiership, there must be at least four scrutineers. FUSTA currently recommends and endorses the program called Highland Scrutineer or any other SOBHD approved scoring system.

Occasionally, cases arise where the results are entered by hand instead of using a computer. For example, you might experience a power outage, other computer problems, or you might not want to expose your computer to the weather. Therefore, let's proceed through the steps for tabulating the results by hand. This portion will take longer than the description of the computer program because you are doing the work by hand and need to understand what you are doing and why which is a good idea even if a computer is used.

During a Competition, Championship, or Premiership, from the first set until the final set danced, no person should be allowed to contact the judge(s) except the scrutineers or the steward authorized to collect the judge's sheets on behalf of the scrutineers.

The decision of the judge is final and no discussion or correspondence can be entered into between a judge and competitor or the parent/guardian of a competitor regarding any decision made by that judge. Judges' marks are only made available for scrutineering purposes and must not be given out to competitors, parents, teachers or general enquires.

If a judge alters a mark, such alteration must be clearly initialed. Marking sheets should be handed to the steward (runner) before judges leave their seats and they cannot be altered thereafter unless to correct any error of detail discovered by the scrutineer.

In Championships, Premierships, or Choreography (whenever 3 judges adjudicate an event) the first six placings of each judge will be scrutineered and displayed.

Best Judging Practice:

- Each competitor's number must be written down by the judge.
- Each competitor must be awarded a mark after completing their dance and prior to the commencement of the next set.
- The reason for disqualification of any competitor must be clearly stated.
- Judges must sign their own judging sheets.
- Judges should give 6 clear placing in a Championship or Premiership and for competitions provide the requisite clear placings requested by the organizer.
- There should be no parking marks given.
- If a mark is altered, such alteration must be clearly initialed by the judge.
- When marks are deducted, the judge should make it clear on their sheet that this has been done and put their final mark in the "total" column.
- All competitor numbers and marks need to be clear and legible.
- Judges should refrain from self-scrutineering.
- Judges sheets should be completed in pen.
- Judges should ensure they have taken down the correct number for each dancer and ensure that they allocate the correct mark for each dancer.

Note: If this is a large Championship or Premiership, consider collecting a sample of each Judge's handwriting (Appendix A).

Effective January 2017: judge's placings should be converted to the subsequent points:

1st place	137
2nd place	91
3rd place	71
Ath place	53

4th place 53

5th place376th place23

The following system must be carried out for each event.

Step One: Collect the judges' sheets for a dance as soon as it is completed. Quickly make sure all marks are legible, that every dancer has a score and that the judge has signed the sheet. If something is amiss, approach the judge as soon as possible but not during a dance (i.e. at the end of the age group/section).

Step Two: Convert each Judge's Marks to a rank order. The dancer with the highest mark is 1, the next highest is 2, and so on through number 6. You do not need to rank placings after 6 in a Championship or Premiership. Occasionally, in a regular competition with large classes, the organizer will request that you rank placings to a specific number beyond 6 according to the number of prizes to be awarded.

The Judge's Marks are important and should only be used for determining placings. A small difference in Judge's Marks counts the same as a large difference. Here are some examples. In each case, the Judge's Mark is shown first and then the placing. The marks by the three judges differed sharply, but placings for Judge A and B are identical. <u>Only the placings count</u>.

Suppose Judge C gave two dancers identical marks on one dance and both are high enough to finish in the top six placings. In that case, both dancers get the rank of the higher placing. For instance, if they tied for third place, they both get the Dance Points for finishing third. No one places fourth. The dancer with the next highest marks places fifth. See above for an example:

<u>Step Three:</u> Convert dancers' placings to Dance Points, using only this scale, as approved effective January 2017 by the Scottish Official Board of Highland Dancing (SOBHD)

Step Four: If your competition is not a Championship, proceed to Page 21 **How To Scrutineer A Competition**.

However, if you are scrutineering a Championship or a Premiership, you will now combine the results of Judge A, B, and C for each dance and for the total Aggregate Points to determine the Champion/Winner through 6th place. Please note, some Championships, Premierships, and Choreography events may use more than three different judges. Be careful and always ensure the correct judge's rotation and marks are carried forward to the appropriate scrutineering work sheet.

You will have a scrutineering work sheet for each dance (Appendix B). Next to each dancer number will be three columns to enter the Dance Points converted from each of the three judge's marks. That is, you take the Dance Points that you determined in Step Three and enter them. You repeat for each of the three judges.

Next you add the points for the three judges, going across for each dancer. Example:

The total of the Dance Points (fifth column) determines the placing for this dance. So you can now enter who placed first, second, and so forth in the sixth column. After you finish that column, you convert placing to Championship Points in the seventh column.

Again, use the formula: first = 137, second = 91, third = 71, fourth = 53, fifth = 37, sixth = 23. The Championship Points will carry on to the next step.

Sometimes two or three dancers will tie on the number of Dance Points. If so, each receives the points for the highest placing. In the example below, three dancers tied for second place. All three receive 91 points for finishing second. No one receives points for third or fourth place. The next dancer places fifth and receives 37 points.

To add the Dance Points (e.g., 53 + 71 + 91), you have a number of choices: First, you can do it in your head or with pencil and paper, as you were taught in school. (How rusty is your arithmetic?) Second, you can use a calculator, preferably one that prints a tape. Or third, you may use a Scrutineering Quick Finder (see full printable Quick Finder in Appendix C).

REMINDERS:

- If one judge becomes ill or is otherwise unavailable at the last moment and no replacement is available, a Championship or Premiership may proceed with two judges. Treat the third judge as if he/she had given zeros to all dancers.
- Judges must clearly initial any changes they make on their sheet.
- Once the judges' sheets have been collected, a judge may <u>not</u> request to see a sheet again for the purpose of changing his/her initial scores unless to correct any error of detail discovered by the scrutineer.
- Judges may use fractions to separate dancers but not decimals.
- Someone from the scrutineering team should approach the judge if a dancer does not have a score, if a number is unreadable, or a judge failed to sign his/her sheet. Wait until the end of a class to approach a judge because it holds up the competition and breaks the focus and train of thought.
- If there is any uncertainty about a judge's handwriting, please don't guess, verify judge's mark with that judge.
- Keep track of the different judges. They may change positions for the each dance to give each equal vantage points during the competition.
- Some scrutineering committees find it useful to color code each judge's individual sheets and to put the same code on the scrutineering sheet.

All right, time to test yourself again. Here are three judges' sheets. Determine the placings, enter them in the scrutineering sheet, assign Dance Points, and then determine each dancer's Total Dance Points. Finally, determine the Placings and Championship Points. When you finish, check answer B, Page 25. During an actual competition, you will work with a partner, so that one of you checks the other one's entries and addition. If someone is entering the results onto a computer, the people doing it by hand should now compare your results to those of the computer. If you find a discrepancy, search until you find the mistake. Sometimes it's your mistake; sometimes someone entered numbers incorrectly into the computer.

Keep all Judges' sheets, computer printouts, and worksheets neatly organized in a "two envelope" folder.

Step Five: Aggregating Results from Several Dances

You will repeat the previous steps for each dance during the competition. For each dance, you enter the Dance Points for each dancer on the **Aggregate sheet**. To speed up the process at the end of the competition, you can enter the results for each dance and tabulate as you go. For example, enter the Fling results on the Aggregate Sheet as soon as you have them, while the Sword is still underway.

In the Championship Aggregate Sheet example below, you will see each competitors' Championship Points on each of four dances, plus the Total Points.

It is not necessary to list every dancer on the Aggregate work sheet or in numeric order. It is very important that the corresponding dance results are recorded correctly on the Aggregate work sheet. Also, you may want to keep a running total as you go. See the next example.

Step Six: Breaking a Tie in a Championship – Method One.

Back in Step Four, where you were combining three judges' results for a *single dance*, you would *not* break ties. If two or three dancers tied for one place, each of them receives it. However, at the end of a Championship, if a tie resulted for any of the dancers in top six overall placings, you must attempt to break the tie.

There are three SOBHD approved methods of breaking ties. Each Method must be calculated in order. If none is successful, the tie(s) stands (as unbroken). Therefore, stop on the Method used if the tie is broken.

Method One counts the number of times dancers involved in the tie(s) placed first overall (received a 1st place prize or medal) in the four dances. **Do NOT** count the number of times out of a possible twelve that an individual judge placed someone first. What counts is the number of times that a dancer finished first *overall* for a given dance.

If the tied dancers did not receive a 1st place medal or prize in any of the four dances, move on to Breaking a Tie, Method Two.

Dancers 451 and 452 tied with 334 Total Championship Points. Dancer 451 finished with first in two dances (Fling and Sword) whereas Dancer 452 finished first on only one dance (Fling). The tie is broken in favor of Dancer 451 using **Method One**. Dancer 451 finishes ahead of dancer 452 . **It is not necessary to use any other steps to break the tie.**

Method One could not break the tie because neither of the tied dancers received a 1st place medal or prize in one of four dances. **Method Two**, using Dance Points, will be tried.

Step Seven: Breaking a Tie, Method Two.

If two dancers tie on Total Championship Points and have the same number of 1st place medals or prizes or no 1st place medals or prizes, **Method Two** is used to break the tie.

You will have one Individual Dance sheet for each dance, like the ones we tabulated under Step Four. We converted Dance Points to Placings, and then Placings to Championship Points, but now we need to go back to the Dance Points. For each of the dancers who are tied, determine the sum of their Dance Points for all four dances. Here is an example, showing just the two tied dancers:

Step Eight: Breaking a Tie, Method Three.

If two dancers tie and neither **Methods One** nor **Two** can break the tie, use **Method Three**. Go back to the Individual Dance worksheet and for each of the tied dancers, count how many times he or she placed (any of the spots first through sixth) on each of the Judges' Sheets. For example, if all three judges placed a dancer on the fling, two did on the sword, and all three did on the remaining two dances, that dancer has a total of 11 Judges' Placings. If all three judges placed the other dancer in all four dances, that dancer has a total of 12 Judges' Placings, and the tie is broken in that dancers' favor.

Dancer 354 was placed by two judges in the HP and VM and by all three judges in the HL for a total of 7 Judge's placings.

Dancer #359 has more Judge's placings and therefore finishes ahead of Dancer #354.

If dancers are still tied after using **Method Three**, they finish in a tie and they receive the same prize. <u>Use no further methods to break the tie</u>.

Finally, Before Handing the Results to the Announcer

Be sure that the hand tabulation agrees with the computer result. Be sure all the scrutineers agree. Finally, take a look at the results. Do they look plausible, or does anything raise doubts? If a dancer who has never done well before is listed as the champion, or if a dancer who usually wins is listed far down in the rankings, now is the time to double-check. Upsets do occur. That's why we have contests, instead of just handing the awards to the expected winner.

However, mistakes do happen. That is why final checks are such an important part of the process. It is always better to catch mistakes before the results are announced.

Should any points arise not covered by the SOBHD Scrutineering Rules, the matters shall be left for the judges to decide and their decision shall be final. Before arriving at a decision, the judges may consult with the organizer is they deem it advisable to do so.

When possible provide copies of the Award results and Judge's Postings to the judges before or at the same time as the results are announced. Always remember for any event/dance judged by three judges, the postings must be display (after awards are announced).

Test Yourself From Start to Finish

On the following pages you will find three Judges' Sheets for each of four dances, and sheets to enter all of your tabulations. The results have been devised to give you practice at breaking ties. Work through these sheets, and then check Answer C, pages 26 - 32. If you can handle this example, you are ready for anything!

Keep track of the different judges. They will change places for each dance. Color coding helps here.

In Championships, Premierships, or Choreography (whenever 3 judges adjudicate an event) the first six placings of each judge must be displayed (after all awards are announced).

How To Scrutineer A Competition

Step One: Collect the judges' sheets for a dance as soon as it is completed. Quickly make sure all marks are legible, that every dancer has a score and that the judge has signed the sheet. If something is amiss, approach the judge as soon as possible but not during a dance (i.e. at the end of the age group/section).

Step Two: Convert each Judge's Marks to a rank order. The dancer with the highest mark is 1, the next highest is 2, and so on through number 6. In a regular competition with large classes, the organizer will request that you rank placings to a specific number beyond 6 according to the number of prizes to be awarded.

The Judge's Marks are important and should only be used for determining placings. A small difference in Judge's Marks counts the same as a large difference. <u>Only the placings count</u>.

<u>Step Three:</u> Convert dancers' placings to Dance Points, using only this scale, as approved effective January 2017 by the Scottish Official Board of Highland Dancing (SOBHD)

Step Four:

Transfer the results to the Aggregate Worksheet. Remember: If a Judge gives two dancers identical marks in one dance and both are high enough to finish in the organizers' number of placings, both dancers get the rank of the higher placing. For instance, if they tied for third place, they both get the Dance Points for finishing third. No one places fourth. The dancer with the next highest marks places fifth.

Finally, Before Handing the Results to the Announcer

Be sure all the scrutineers agree. Finally, take a look at the results. Do they look plausible, or does anything raise doubts? If a dancer who has never done well before is listed as the winner, or if a dancer who usually wins is listed far down in the rankings, now is the time to double-check. Upsets do occur. That's why we have contests, instead of just handing the awards to the expected winner.

However, mistakes do happen. That is why final checks such an important part of the process. It is always better to catch mistakes before the results are announced.

Should any points arise not covered by the SOBHD Scrutineering Rules, the matters shall be left for the judge(s) to decide and their decision shall be final. Before arriving at a decision, the judge(s) may consult with the organizer is they deem it advisable to do so.


